- Construction is anticipated to begin in July 2022 and end in October 2022. In-water construction elements of the project will be conducted during approved work windows included in state and federal agency approvals. To determine timing restrictions for hydraulic projects for which WDFW will issue a Hydraulic Project Approval, WDFW looks at the times when spawning or incubating salmonids are least likely to be within the freshwater habitat. The WDFW recommended in water work window is June 20 through August 31. However, it should be noted that WDFW or the Corps may further restrict the allowable in-water work period when issuing permits for this Project.

WDFW proposes a project to renovate the Johns River access site located in Grays Harbor County as part of the Johns River Wildlife Area. The primary recreational opportunities provided by this project are motorized boating, hunting, fishing, and wildlife viewing. The scope of this project is to:

- Gather and remove quarry rock adjacent to the boat ramp
- Remove the existing concrete plank boat launch
- Prepare the base for the new concrete planks and articulated concrete matting (ACM)
- Install new precast concrete planks and ACM
- Install a new CXT Single Gunnison restroom
- Add two inches of crushed surfacing top course (CSTC) gravel on the existing gravel parking lot

The existing boat ramp is in deteriorating condition and is in need of replacement. A new concrete boat ramp will replace the existing ramp. ACM will be installed to prevent washout around and underneath the concrete planks. The existing parking area will be replenished with approximately two inches of CSTC and a new CXT Single Gunnison restroom will be installed and the existing vault toilet will be removed.

b. What is the steepest slope on the site (approximate percent slope)?

The boat launch is at an approximate grade of 14.6 percent

c. What general types of soils are found on the site (for example, clay, sand, gravel, peat, muck)? If you know the classification of agricultural soils, specify them and note any

Soils are perennially wet, and consists of clay, sand, and small gravels. The National Resources Conservation Service's Web Soil Survey characterizes the soil types in the vicinity of the Project as Calawah silt loam and Ocosta silty clay loam. No soils of commercial significance will be disturbed by the Project.

d. Are there surface indications or history of unstable soils in the immediate vicinity? If so, describe.

There are no indications or history of unstable soils within the Project area.

e. Describe the purpose, type, total area, and approximate quantities and total affected area of any filling, excavation, and grading proposed. Indicate source of fill.

**Remove existing quarry spalls** – Approximately 10 cubic yards of quarry rock has been displaced along the bed of the Johns River adjacent to the existing ramp. This material will be removed from an approximate 110 foot by 40 foot area.

**Remove existing concrete planks** – The existing boat ramp is approximately 112-feet long by 12-feet wide. The existing planks, totaling approximately 17 cubic yards will be excavated and removed to an offsite location.

**Prepare a new base** – Approximately 6 inches of crushed surfacing base course (CSBC), 1 1/4-inch or less in diameter crushed rock, will be graded and compressed. A layer of geotextile fabric will be placed on top of the compressed CSBC and 4 inches of CSTC, 5/8-inch or less in diameter gravel, will be compressed on top of the geotextile fabric. The CSBC and CSTC will be placed underneath the new ramp for its entire length and cover a total area of 112 feet by 20 feet.

**Install new concrete planks** – Precast concrete planks, 4-foot by 12-foot by 6-inches, will be installed on top of the CSTC. The new ramp will cover a total area of approximately 112 feet by 12 feet.

**Install ACM** – The ACM will be installed 4 feet on each side of the concrete planks. The ACM will consist of 20 percent open space and occupy a total area of 112 feet by 8 feet. ACM will be anchored in place with stainless steel cable and mantaray anchors driven into place.

**Grade the existing parking lot** – The existing footprint of the parking lot will be replenished with a 2-inch layer of crushed surfacing top course (5/8-inch minus gravel). This will cover an area of approximately 26,397 square feet and total approximately 163 cubic yards of material.

f. Could erosion occur as a result of clearing, construction, or use? If so, generally describe. Grading of the parking lot will occur on a generally flat area, so erosion potential will be limited. Grading of the boat launch may create some localized erosion that will end up in the Johns River. Best Management Practices (BMPs), including a turbidity curtain, will be installed to limit the extent of turbidity caused by temporary erosion.

g. About what percent of the site will be covered with impervious surfaces after project construction (for example, asphalt or buildings)?

The concrete portion of the new boat ramp will remain the same dimensions as the existing ramp. The total area of impervious surfaces is not proposed to increase for the new ramp.

h. Proposed measures to reduce or control erosion, or other impacts to the earth, if any: Construction activities will be conducted in accordance with a temporary erosion and sediment control plan. The construction crew will monitor conditions and ensure that these practices and preventive measures are undertaken. Any bare earth area where no near-term work is scheduled will be immediately stabilized with seeding, mulching, or other appropriate methods.

## 2. Air [help]

a. What types of emissions to the air would result from the proposal during construction, operation, and maintenance when the project is completed? If any, generally describe and give approximate quantities if known.

No emissions to the air would result from the operation and maintenance of the boat launch and parking area. Emissions would occur from construction equipment and support vehicles during construction.

b. Are there any off-site sources of emissions or odor that may affect your proposal? If so, generally describe.

We are not aware of any off-site sources of emissions or odors that would affect the site.

c. Proposed measures to reduce or control emissions or other impacts to air, if any:
 BMPs would be used to control temporary air pollutant emissions in the construction area. Those will consist of requiring proper maintenance of construction equipment, avoiding prolonged idling

of vehicles, and spraying water to minimize dust. Standard emission control converters and mufflers will be used by construction vehicles.

    - The installation of the concrete planks and ACM will take place above and below ordinary high water mark of the Johns River. The grading of the parking lot will occur within 200 feet of the Johns River.

3) Estimate the amount of fill and dredge material that would be placed in or removed from surface water or wetlands and indicate the area of the site that would be affected. Indicate the source of fill material.

Approximately 24 cubic yards (cy) of material will be cut below the OHWM in order to remove the existing concrete boat launch in its existing 12-foot by 112-foot footprint. This includes 14 CY for the concrete planks and 10 CY for quarry spalls.

New fill will total approximately 66 cubic yards of material below the OHWM. The new material includes 6 inches of CSBC, geotextile fabric of negligible thickness, 4 inches of CSTC, then 6-inch thick concrete planks on top.

4) Will the proposal require surface water withdrawals or diversions? Give general description, purpose, and approximate quantities if known.

This Project will not require surface water withdrawals or diversions.

- 5) Does the proposal lie within a 100-year floodplain? If so, note location on the site plan. The eastern portion of the parking area and boat launch is located within a 100-year floodplain (FEMA) and classified as Zone A. The vault toilet is located outside of the mapped Zone A.

The proposed Project will not involve any discharges of waste materials to surface waters.

A floating silt curtain will be utilized when equipment is actively working on the boat ramp. Straw wattles will be utilized to contain sediment when the parking lot surface is being graded.

Yes, storm water runoff could contain chemicals from vehicles or fine sediments that are not completely captured through infiltration. During construction, temporary BMPs will be implemented to reduce erosion and runoff.
- 3) Does the proposal alter or otherwise affect drainage patterns in the vicinity of the site? If so, describe.

The proposed Project will include minimal grading at the boat launch and parking area and will not alter drainage patterns.

Any BMPs necessary to reduce runoff will be implemented. These include straw wattles, weed free straw bales, or silt fencing.

    The site is actively used as a boat launch and may have some incidental contamination from fuel and oil leaks from boats and trucks actively using the site.

  - We are not aware of any existing hazardous chemicals/conditions that would affect the Project development.

  - The only potential environmental hazard from the Project would come from accidental leaks of fuels and other fluids from construction equipment and vehicles using the construction area. Refueling will occur at least 100 feet from the shoreline, construction BMPs, and construction equipment will be maintained to reduce the potential of contamination during construction activities.
- 4) Describe special emergency services that might be required. The Project will not require any emergency services.
- 5) Proposed measures to reduce or control environmental health hazards, if any: Fueling of vehicles and machinery will be completed on uplands and away from the water body to prevent any source of fuel from entering surface waters. A spill kit will be available on site in the event of an accidental spill.

#### b. Noise

  - No noise will affect the Project. The nearby Highway 105 will be the largest source of unnatural sound in the area.

The Project will generate noise from construction vehicles during construction. Equipment is anticipated to run during working hours of operation (6 a.m. to 10 p.m., Monday through Friday) for the majority of the Project.

The primary long term noise source will result from rural traffic and boat launch-related activities. Noise levels will vary depending on the time of day, the day of the week, and time of year, with presumably higher noise levels during weekends and months when the launch is more actively used.

3) Proposed measures to reduce or control noise impacts, if any:

Short-term noise will be created from machines used during construction, limited to typical working hours of 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

The site is currently used to provide waterfowl habitat and hunting opportunity, and a WDFW public access site. The properties to the west between Game Farm Road and Highway 105 are privately owned rural residential lands.

## 13. Historic and cultural preservation [help]

There are not any buildings, structures, or sites located within the project area that are over 45 years old that are eligible for listing in national, state, or local preservation register. However, according to DAHP's WISAARD database the project area is located within a Maritime Heritage Area. Additionally, there are three archaeological sites (45GH00010 Shell Mound, 45GH00117 Historic Railroad Property, and 45GH00144 John's River Cemetery) located within a 1.0-mile radius of the project area.

b. Are there any landmarks, features, or other evidence of Indian or historic use or occupation? This may include human burials or old cemeteries. Are there any material evidence, artifacts, or areas of cultural importance on or near the site? Please list any professional studies conducted at the site to identify such resources.

There are not any landmarks, features, or other evidence of Indian or historic use or occupation located on the project area. A site visit was completed on September 29th, 2021 by WDFW archaeolgist Kayley Bass and WDFW cultural intern Amanda Carlson. During this site visit the project area was walked and the ground surface was inspected. There was not any material evidence observed during this site visit. Site 45GH00010 is the only site within a 1.0-mile radius of the project area that shows evidence of Indian use or occupation in the area. Sites 45GH00117 and 45GH00144 are both sites located within a 1.0-mile radius that show evidence of historic use or occupation in the area.

There are not any professional studies that have been conducted in this area, however, three cultural surveys have been completed within a 1-mile radius of the APE (Kelly 2014; McFarland and Mendez 2018; Zuccotti 2008).

c. Describe the methods used to assess the potential impacts to cultural and historic resources on or near the project site. Examples include consultation with tribes and the department of archeology and historic preservation, archaeological surveys, historic maps, GIS data, etc.

Methods used to assess the potential impacts to cultural and historic resources include completing a site files and records search. Databases and maps, including the Washington Information System for Architectural and Archaeological Records Data (WISAARD), Bureau of Land Management General Land Office (GLO) Cadastral Survey maps, GLO Records, historic aerial maps, and soil maps were all examined for cultural resources within the project area. We also consulted with the Washington Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation (DAHP), Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation, Quinault Indian Nation, Samish Indian Nation, Shoalwater Bay Indian Tribe, and Squaxin Island Tribe. We only received responses from DAHP and the Squaxin Island Tribe.

d. Proposed measures to avoid, minimize, or compensate for loss, changes to, and disturbance to resources. Please include plans for the above and any permits that may be required.

Following consultation with DAHP, the John's River Boat Ramp Repairs project was determined to have no adverse cultural resource impacts with the stipulations for professional archaeological monitoring and for an inadvertent discovery plan (IDP). Archaeological monitoring will help avoid and minimize disturbance to any cultural resources that are subsurface.
