#### Annual Operation Plans (AOPs)


- 1. District Staff: Risk assessment
- 2. Regional Meetings (including some statewide staff):
  - Review risk assessment(s)
  - Determine which permits need AOPs
  - Review appropriate measures
- 3. Wildlife Area Manager/Wildlife Conflict Specialist: Initiate dialogue with Permittee(s) and develop appropriate language
- (4.) Sanitation Measures\*

\*~23 AOPs contained measures exceeding default sanitation measures, e.g. frequent range riding



Variety of quantitative soil and vegetation indicators are tracked over time and reported in grazing management plan:




### Simcoe Unit Monitoring

#### Commission Review: New Permits

WAC 220-500-200 Livestock grazing on department of fish and wildlife lands

... (3) With the following three exceptions, grazing permits shall first be submitted to the commission, which may review the permits to ensure that they conform to commission policy: (a) Temporary permits; (b) Permits that are being renewed or renegotiated for acreage where the department has permitted non-temporary grazing during the previous ten years; and (c) Permits that are being issued for acreage acquired by the department within the previous twelve months. If, within thirty days, the commission has not disapproved a permit, [WDFW] shall be deemed authorized to issue that permit. ...



#### Proposed Review Process

- 1) Grazing materials (proposed permit, grazing plan, maps, etc.) are provided to the Commission four weeks prior to a scheduled Commission presentation.
- 2) Commissioners are requested, but not required, to submit in writing any questions regarding the proposed permit within two weeks to allow staff time to incorporate responses within the scheduled Commission presentation.
- 3) Staff present the proposed permit in Commission meeting no more than 30 days after Step (1). No action is requested.
- 4) If the permit is not disapproved, WDFW shall be authorized to issue the permit.
