


2021 season, WDFW will continue to engage anglers to ensure that the most up to date information is available ahead of next season.





Ad-Hoc Coastal Steelhead Advisory Group

In 2021, WDFW formed the Ad-Hoc Coastal Steelhead Advisory Group to inform the development of a plan to protect native and hatchery-produced steelhead for each river system of Grays Harbor, Willapa Bay, and coastal Olympic Peninsula, as required by the Washington Legislature in the 2021-23 budget. The Department will submit the ensuing plan to the Legislature by the end of 2022.

The 12-member ad-hoc committee reflects a broad cross-section of the coastal steelhead guides, research scientists, sport anglers, business owners, environmentalists, and others who are committed to coastal steelhead recovery. The group will meet virtually in 2022 with meetings planned for February, March, April, June, August, and September. More information about coastal steelhead management is available at wdfw.wa.gov/coastal-steelhead.

- Based on available tools and wild steelhead population status




