Purpose

- Provide annual review to the Commission regarding Commission Policy C-3001 "2011-2013 Lower Columbia Sturgeon Management"
- The Lower Columbia white sturgeon population is defined as inhabiting the lower Columbia River (below Bonneville Dam) and associated tributaries and migrates into marine areas, coastal bays and tributaries and Puget Sound

- Review in-season management actions
- Accounting of fish left unharvested
- Review of harvest outside lower Columbia River
- By-catch in all fisheries

Policy Guidance

2012 Amendment to the Joint State Accord

- Harvest rate of 16% (10,088 fish) for 2012
- Harvest guideline for 2013 to be determined after assessing population trend relative to management objective of providing population growth



Population Assessment Tools

- Abundance estimation
 - Two mark and recapture approaches
 - 1) Sample harvest for tag recoveries
 - 2) Research setline survey to obtain recoveries
 - Setline-based estimate
 - Available within a few months
 - Includes all size segments of the population
- Sport fishery CPUE
- Sub-yearling productivity indexing




Over Legal-size Catch Trend Columbia River Gorge



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


Over Legal-size Catch Trend Willamette River






Sub-Yearling Production Index

USACE Bonneville Dam Observations






2012 Management Lower Columbia River Fisheries

Harvest Outside Columbia River

- 2012 harvest guidelines for Willapa Bay and Grays Harbor reduced by the same 39% as for the Columbia River
- Retention season implemented for Puget Sound, reduced to 2.5 months from year-round



Sturgeon By-catch

- Commercial and sport fisheries were monitored for by-catch during the fall of 2012
- Preliminary results are consistent with past observations
- A final report will be completed in early 2013


Public Involvement

- Staff hosted six public meetings on sturgeon management during 2012:
 - Portland (July 17)
 - Longview (July 18)
 - Astoria (July 19)

- Raymond (July 24)
- Montesano (July 31)
- Puget Sound at Mill Creek (July 26)
- A questionnaire was distributed at the meetings covering a broad range of topics – 28 questions
- Topics included management objectives and fishery regulations

Other Information

Zone 6 Management (Bonneville Dam to McNary Dam)

- Managed under U.S. v Oregon
- The fish are isolated within each reservoir
 - Considered separate populations
 - Distinct from the lower Columbia River population
 - Healthy enough to support sport and tribal harvest

Recommended Changes Columbia River Fishery Management Workgroup

- Sport/commercial allocation no change, except reduce the guideline by 10% as a conservation buffer
- Consider non-retention fisheries beginning in 2013
 - Lower Columbia River
 - Washington and Oregon coastal areas
 - Puget Sound

WDFW 2013-14 Sport Fishing Rule Proposals

- Potential changes included in proposal package for public comment:
 - Catch and release only/changes to open areas
 - Size limit changes
 - 2-fish annual limit
 - Changes to gear requirement (i.e. circle hook required)

Other Information

Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission

- September 7, 2012 adopted 2-fish annual limit effective January 1, 2013
- December 7, 2012:
 - Adopted 1-fish annual limit effective January 1, 2013
 - Adopted rule prohibiting white sturgeon retention in the Columbia River and tributaries downstream of Bonneville Dam and for Oregon coastal estuaries and river systems <u>effective January 1, 2014</u>

Action Requested

Per Commission Policy C-3001, decision making authority has been delegated to the Director

 Provide guidance to the Director to move forward with developing rules for lower Columbia River and tributaries, Washington coastal estuaries and rivers, and for marine and freshwater areas of Puget Sound




