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



Sturgeon Policy – Purpose

• The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for management of the lower Columbia River white sturgeon population and fisheries.

Sturgeon Policy – Definition and Intent

• The Lower Columbia River white sturgeon population inhabits the waters of the Columbia River and tributaries downstream of Bonneville Dam and migrates into ocean and coastal estuaries. The intent of the policy is to provide consistent management guidelines that promote a healthy population.

Sturgeon Policy – General Policy Statement

 Manage the Lower Columbia River white sturgeon population with conservation and fishery management objectives that are consistent with a healthy population.

Sturgeon Policy – Policy Guidelines

- Conservation Objectives
- Fishery Management Objectives
- Annual Review
- Delegation of Authority

Public Input

- No public input on draft policy.

 - About equal support for/against retention fishery

Other Information

Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission

- Adopted 2-fish annual limit effective May 1, 2013
- Adopted retention prohibition for Columbia River and tributaries below Bonneville Dam and for Oregon coastal estuaries and river systems, effective Jan. 1, 2014
- Both regulations consistent with WDFW


