WAC Requirement

- Currently 46 listed species
- WAC 232-12-297 requires that we review the status of listed species every five years to determine if they require:
 - Uplisting

 (e.g. sensitive to endangered)
 - Downlisting
 (e.g. endangered to threatened)
 - No change in status



Petitions for Uplisting or Downlisting

- WAC also allows for interested parties to send a petition to the Director
- Should set forth specific evidence and scientific data showing 1) a species may be failing, declining, or vulnerable or 2) a species may no longer be failing, declining, or vulnerable.
- Within 60 days, the agency shall either deny the petition, stating the reasons, or initiate a status review.



Periodic Status Review Process

- Listing and Recovery Section
- Streamlined status review for most, with more detail/info for species that require a listing change
- Press Release Feb 11- One year for interested parties to contribute information:



- Species demographics
- Habitat conditions
- Threats and trends
- Conservation measures benefiting the species
- New data since last status review

Status Review Underway

- Federal Delisting of Steller Sea Lion Eastern Distinct Population
 Segment (1997= 37,000 to 2010 = 70,000)
- WA State population is only a small proportion of DPS, requirement to review for WA specifically

Species Status Review

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is embarking on a multi-year process to review the status of wildlife species listed as endangered, threatened or sensitive in the state.

Hunting

Enforcement

The agency will consider approximately 15 species at a time and will seek information from the public for one year before concluding the reviews. This process allows WDFW to determine whether each species warrants its current listing or deserves to be reclassified or delisted.

Explanations for the status categories can be found on WDFWs Species of Concern Website.

The species evaluations will help WDFW and its partners to assess progress toward recovery of state-listed species. The process also will help WDFW to identify and prioritize conservation needs for these species.
