GMP 2015-21 Process

- Survey of the General Public May 20
- Comment on Draft GMP June 9 to July22 1689 participated
- Six Public Meetings June 17 to 26
- Commission Briefing and Hearing Aug 8 & 9
- Survey of the Hunters August 26
- Revising the Key Plan Elements based on Public Comment – October 15
- Public Comment on the Revised Plan October 15 to November 21
- Commission Adoption December 12 & 13

2015-21 General Public Opinion Survey Results

Responsive Management - Telephone Survey

- Support for hunting
- Wildlife Conflict
- Predator Management
- Wolf Management
- Hunter Recruitment/
 Participation



General Public Opinion Survey

- The majority of Washington Residents support hunting – 2014 88%
- Over a quarter of Washington Citizens reported having a conflict w/wildlife in the past two years (29%)
- Strong support (70%) for maintaining sustainable predator populations
- Strong support (71%) for reducing predator populations to increase suppressed deer or elk herds

General Public Opinion Survey

- There is good support for wolf recovery (64% support vs 27% oppose)
- There is even better support for delisting wolves once they meet recovery objectives (73% vs 15%)
- Lethal control to protect livestock (63% vs 28%)
- Lethal control to protect ungulates (55% vs 32%)



General Public Opinion Survey

- Hunting Wolves after recovery:
 - Support establishing a hunting season (63% vs 28%)
 - To maintain wolf population objectives (69% vs 23%)
 - To provide recreation (38% vs 53%)
- A third of Washington residents (35%) reported hunting at some time in their lives

Comments Received on 2015-21 Draft Plan

- We received 1689 communications: email, surveys completed, and letters
- With over 4000 categories of comments



Public Comments

- Issues receiving most interest included:
 - Predator-prey management
 - Wolf management
 - Recruitment, retention, and reactivation
 - Non-toxic ammunition
 - Hunter access
 - Wildlife conflict
 - Elk and deer
 - Bear and cougar



Public Comment-Major Themes Predator-Prey Management

- Let nature takes its course, predators cannot over populate if they don't have the prey available
- The guidelines are too restrictive and would not result in any actions being taken
- You can't take humans out of the equation there are 7 million in this state, wildlife needs to be managed



Public Comment-Major Themes Wolf Management

- Wolves are not game species and don't belong in the game management plan
- It is too early to be talking about a plan for managing wolves after they are delisted;
- A plan for managing wolves after they reach recovery objectives should have been completed already
- Given the controversy associated with wolves, starting a plan now makes sense



Public Comment-Major Themes Recruitment, Retention, and Re-activation

- Concerned that this is just a means to increase revenue to WDFW
- Lower the price of licenses and hunter numbers will increase
- Increase the number of nature watchers not hunters
- Find other ways to support the Department



Public Comment-Major Themes

Non-toxic Ammunition

- Eliminate lead ammunition now, it is toxic and kills or poisons wildlife
- Document problems before creating restrictions



Public Comment-Major Themes

Hunter Access

- By far the greatest concern was the fee access issues in western Washington associated with industrial timberlands
- There was a lot of support and suggestions for how to address the access issue




Public Comment-Major Themes Wildlife Conflict

- The greatest concern was bear damage issues with industrial timberlands
- Again, there were many suggestions for how to improve the conflict program
- The use of non-lethal measures was popular



Public Comment-Major Themes Elk and Deer

- Concern about predation effects was a common comment
- Improvement of surveys and population monitoring was also commonly stated
- Lots of comments related to hunting season regulations
- Hoof disease concerns



Public Comment-Major Themes Cougar and Bear

- Again, concern about predator numbers and effects on prey was a common comment
- Support for considering prey population levels in managing predator population levels

Hunter Opinion Survey Results Where do Washington Residents Hunt

- Most Washington hunters have also hunted out of state (62%)
- Hunting on public lands exceeds hunting on private lands (74% of deer & 90% of elk hunters)
- Between 8 and 19% of hunters have utilized WDFW private lands access programs (1.2 million acres)



Hunter Opinion Survey Results

Wildlife Management Strategies

- Communication about game mgmt activities (92%)
 - Publications (pamphlet)
 - WDFW Website
 - Email
 - Direct mail
- Controlling ATVs and Snowmobiles (over 69%)
- Public Access to Timberlands (over 77%)



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Wolf Management

- Hunters opinions on wolf recovery appears to have changed from 2007
- The majority of hunters oppose wolf recovery
- 76% of elk hunters
 oppose recovery and 53%
 of small game hunters
- The number one reason: Impacts to ungulates



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Lead Ammunition

- No consensus among hunters whether non-lead ammunition is important for the future of hunting:
 - 35% of deer hunters agree vs 44% disagree
 - 50% of small game hunters agree vs 38% disagree
- Deer and small game hunters supported incentives to voluntarily use non-lead ammunition
- Elk, cougar, and bear hunters opposed incentives



Hunter Opinion Survey Results

Special Hunting Opportunities for Hunter Recruitment & Retention

- Support expressed for special opportunities for:
 - First time hunters 70%
 - Youth 88%
 - Seniors 91%
 - Hunters with disabilities
 95%



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Deer Hunting Opportunity

- 74 % Satisfied with their deer hunting in Washington
 - Reasons why hunters weren't more satisfied:
 - Limited game
 - Limited harvest
 - Access
 - Restrictive regulations



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Deer Hunting Opportunity

- 53% rate the Department as good or excellent; 31% fair; and 12% poor
 - Reasons for not rating higher:
 - Restrictive regulations
 - Length & timing of seasons
 - Not enough game
- Some improvement from the 2007 survey: 50%; 24%; and 20%



Hunter Opinion Survey Results

Deer Hunting Opportunity

- The majority of deer hunters say the season length is:
 - About right 64%
 - Too short 31%
 - Too long 3%
- The majority of deer hunters oppose hunting over bait:
 - 59% oppose
 - 20% neutral
 - 21% support



Hunter Opinion Survey Results

Elk Hunting Opportunity

- The majority of elk hunters are satisfied with their hunting experiences – 56%
- But a substantial number are not – 36%
- Reasons:
 - Not enough game
 - Access problems
 - Regulations
 - Crowding
 - Season length/timing



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Elk Hunting Opportunity

- The majority of elk hunters rated the Department as:
 - Excellent or good 47%
 - Fair 32%
 - Poor 20%
- This rating has declined since 2007 from 54%; 30%; and 12% respectively



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Elk Hunting Opportunity

- About half of hunters say the season is about right and half say it's too short
- Opposition to hunting elk over bait:
 - 68 % oppose
 - 14% support



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Bear Hunting Opportunity

- Generally bear hunters are satisfied (68%) with their hunting opportunity
- They support spring seasons (84%)
- They support using hunters to address timber damage (82%)
- They favor incentives to increase harvest reporting, but also increasing penalties
- Most oppose mandatory carcass checks (51% oppose and 42% support)



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Cougar Hunting Opportunity

- Generally cougar hunters are satisfied (58%) with their hunting opportunity
- Overall, hunters do not support calling in to check on whether the quotas have been met and the season is still open; 52% oppose vs 43% support



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Pheasant Hunting Opportunity

- Eastern Wash pheasant hunters are mostly <u>not</u> satisfied with their hunting (52%)
- Their issues are:
 - Lack of game
 - Lack of access
 - Poor habitat
- 75% said release of pheasants is important



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Pheasant Hunting Opportunity

- Western Wash pheasant hunters are mostly satisfied with their hunting (66%)
- When asked about costs for managing the program:
 - There was little support for reducing the number of pheasants released (51% oppose)
 - There was more support for increasing the fee instead (57% support)



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Forest Grouse Hunting Opportunity

- Forest grouse hunters are satisfied with their hunting (74%)
- Forest grouse hunters hunt:
 - Intentionally for grouse (65%)
 - Incidental to other species (31%)
 - They like the current season length (78%)
 - They like the current season timing (82%)
 - A majority support separate bag limits (56%)
 - Road closures and restricted access have reduced participation (35% each)



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Game Bird Hunting Opportunity

- Quail hunters are mostly satisfied with their hunting (59%)
- 79% of turkey hunters are satisfied with their hunting opportunity
- 67% of waterfowl hunters are satisfied
- Lack of game is the most common reason stated for why they aren't more satisfied



Hunter Opinion Survey Results Bighorn Sheep, Mountain Goat, & Moose Hunting Opportunity

- Would you prefer more permits but lower trophy quality:
 - 34% more permits
 - 20% fewer permits and higher quality
 - 41% no preference
- What method would be most supported to increase the odds of drawing:
 - 36% said no change
 - Allowing those with the most points to draw (16%)
 - Allowing those with higher points better odds (14%)
 - Give preference to 65 years and older (12%)



Process to Finalize 2015-21 Game Management Plan

- Incorporate Major Remaining Comments
 - Predator/Prey Management
 - Wolf Management
 - Cougar Management
- Send out revised draft for final review mid-October
- Incorporate final comments November 21 30
- Brief the Wildlife Committee December
- Bring final recommendation to Commission December 12 & 13
