## Commissioner Thorburn moved, seconded by Commissioner Graybill to approve the transactions as presented. Motion passed.

## 7. Annual Wolf Update – Briefing

Donny Martorello, Wolf Policy Lead, Candace Bennett, Wildlife Conflict Specialist, Scott McCorquodale, Wildlife Regional Manager and Ben Maletze, Biologist presented an approach to analyzing the scientific literature as Washington changes its management as wolves recover. Wolf Advisory Group Members Dave Duncan, Molly Linville and Paula Sweeney requested some guidance from the Commission on the next steps.

Director Susewind explained that he heard from both the community and staff about proposed changes to wolf location data that the department shares with livestock producers. It was clear that more time was needed before implementing further changes, especially since it is the middle of grazing season. He and staff decided that no further changes to information sharing will occur during the current season and that the conversation will be continued.

Commissioner Holzmiller made a motion to provide policy guidance to the Director to not implement the "Blue Blob" method as a replacement of providing wolf presence information to those who use this information to minimize wolf-livestock interactions, currently scheduled to be implemented in the near future. Direction was given to continue to use the current information along with the "Blue Blob" through the balance of this season. Commissioner McIsaac seconded the motion and it passed.

## 11.2019 – 2021 Operating Budget and Legislative Proposals – Follow Up and Possible Decision

Nate Pamplin, Policy Director and Raquel Crosier, Legislative Liaison provided additional information and requested approval of the proposed packages.

Commissioner Thorburn moved seconded by Commissioner Graybill to approve the following items:

- 2019 second supplemental operating budget
- the long-term funding plan
- reduced fees for disabled hunters and fisher legislative proposal
- extension of the Columbia River Salmon and Steelhead Endorsement Program legislative proposal
- increasing participation in recreational fishing and hunting legislative proposal

All were in favor and the motion passed.

Commissioner Graybill made a motion to remove the Naches Hatchery from the operating budget cut list and add it back to the maintain list, Commissioner Kehne seconded the motion, Commission McIsaac moved to amend the motion to move the entire \$2.4M cut list to the maintain list. Amendment motion failed.

Commission Graybill's main motion all were in favor and the motion passed.

Commissioner Thorburn moved to approve the 2019-21 Operating Budget with Maintenance and Performance items included, Commissioner Baker seconded. Commissioner McIsaac moved to amend the main motion regarding hatchery production enhancements, Commissioner Holzmiller seconded – after discussion the motion was withdrawn and staff were directed to come back at a later date with more details.

The main motion made by Commissioner Thorburn passed.

Commissioner McIsaac made a motion to set the across the board fee increase at 5% and include bullets 1 - Admin fee collected on next purchase and 4 - future inflation fee-setting authority, Commissioner Kehne seconded it and the motion passed.

Vice Chair Carpenter recessed the meeting at 5:03 p.m.

## Commissioner McIsaac moved to provide the following policy position on pinniped management:

Dave Reese

Based on the information on record at this time, and until such time as there is a more equitable balance between the population abundance status of pinniped species and ESA-listed wild salmonid populations in the State of Washington, the Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission advocates for authorization of greater flexibility in the management of pinniped populations in Federal and State legislation, towards a goal of significantly reducing pinniped predation on salmonids. Further, the Commission tasks the Director with expeditious and efficient implementation of any flexibility forthcoming from successful passage of such legislation.

This policy position applies to the Columbia River, coastal river basins, and Puget Sound including the Strait of Juan de Fuca. Flexibility in management activity should include a priority to actively discourage pinniped residence in areas of salmonid predation, including effective harassment and lethal removal, both done in a humane manner that discourages residence and predation behavior.

Commissioner Graybill seconded. Motion passed.

### 15. Miscellaneous and Meeting Debrief

Commissioner Kehne thanked the Commissioners and staff for everything.

## Commissioner Thorburn moved to request a briefing from staff on Pronghorn Conservation and Management. Commissioner Kehoe seconded the motion, all were in favor.

Commissioners asked Director Susewind to take a fresh look at what's going on with the boat launch at Point no Point.

Vice-chair Carpenter adjourned the meeting at 11:24 a.m.
